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I do not have a legal background, but we have discussed pieces oflegislation with some legal experts. There's a simple point in mymind that we are just trying to resolve the contradiction betweenlaws. In Pakistan, the perpetuation of torture and the practice of enforced disappearancescontinue due to ignorance. It is the randomness of the violence that is the most horrifying- violent acts are committed even against our Chief Justice and President. Torture issued to extract bribes, information and confessions. Within the law, torture is not evendefined. Since 2008, there have been attempts to reform our law. We have witnessedthe passing of the 18th, 19th and 20th Amendments to the Constitution since 2010. The power of the central government has become decentralised; provinces have greaterautonomy, to the extent of making reservations. There is more freedom of expression.In 2010, furthermore, Pakistan has acceded to the International Covenants of Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), the International Covenant on Economic, Social and CulturalRights (ICESCR) and the Convention against Torture (CAT), with reservations fullywithdrawn by 2011. We have, as our previous speaker has mentioned, a domestic violenceprevention act that minimally demonstrates the authority's intolerance toward any kindof abuse against the individual. We have legal aid offices; we try to protect women in theworkplace, and so on and so forth. In 2012 there was the Industrial Relations Act, andI dare say our National Human Rights Commissions (NHRC) is rather powerful andindependent.

But I argue that there is strong resistance from the judiciary. The ousted elected primeminister shows the judicial activism. People call it judicial extremisms. A major problemwe face is wonderful work with legislation sans implementation. We have a violentjudiciary and a violent media. Our people may not be ready to accept democracy.
